
2) How to take airplane

- Leave Incheon Airport through exit 3, 4, 10, 11 after finishing formalities of entry, take a bus to Gimpo Airport and get on airplane to Gwangju.  
 ※ Flights are available every 30 to 60minutes and it takes an hour to Gwangju.

**B. From Gwangju to CNU**

From/By	How to Come
<b>Airport</b>	- It takes 30 to 40 minutes from the airport to campus by taxi and costs about KRW 11,000 depending on the traffic situation. - You can come to Jeondae-jeongmun by taking on Route No. 26, 20, 64 at Gwangcheon Bus Terminal (U-Square) after taking an Airport Bus.
<b>Train Station</b>	- Gwangju station is located five minutes away from CNU and you can take a cab at the basic fare.
<b>Express- Local Bus</b>	- If you take express/local bus to Gwangju, you will get off at Gwangcheon Bus Terminal (U-Square). - It take 15 to 20 minutes from terminal to campus by taxi and costs about KRW 5,000. Or you can take a bus, Route No. 26. 30. 64.

If you follow National Road No. 15 up from the Korea Bamboo Museum, you will be mesmerized by a beautiful boulevard that looks like it came straight out of a fairytale. The metasequoia trees along with the bamboo grove add to the exotic and mind-blowing scenery. The saplings that were three to four years old have grown so big and tall that they even block the sky. The Korea Forest Service and Forest for Life selected the Metasequoia-lined Road as the Korea's most beautiful road in 2002.
